Nominations for Second Vice District Governor MD19-L District I Convention April 15, 2023

Election Process, Nominations from the Convention floor:

Nominations for Second Vice District Governor will be accepted from the Convention floor. The call for nominations will made during the morning session April 15, 2023.

- Nominator(s) to verbally state candidate details. Five-minute time allotment.
- Seconder(s) speech, each such nominee for endorsement shall be entitled to one, three-minute speech.
- Finally, the nominated Lion(s) will have an opportunity to accept the nomination. Three-minute time allotment.

The next steps following nomination:

- The qualified candidate(s) will have two weeks in which to submit their letters of endorsement to the District and Club Officers as directed in our Constitution and by-laws. Note: All candidate(s) qualifications will be vetted.
- Successful candidate(s) names to be placed on a ballet and subjected to one vote per Lions Clubs in MD19-I.
- Once Certified as a Candidate by the District Nominating Chair, the voting date will be set by the District Governor with each club in MD19-I receiving ONE vote.

The District Governor will instruct the District Cabinet Secretary/Treasurer to issue the call for a vote. Voting will be by e-mail with the time and date announced by the Cabinet Secretary/Treasurer.

Respectively submitted. PDG Robert (Rob) Dalton Nominations Chair, District Governor, 1st Vice DG, 2nd Vice DG

To qualify, source, MD19 Constitution and By-Laws:

"In order for a Lion to be eligible and qualified to be selected to fill a vacancy in the office of first or second vice district governor, he/she must: (a) Be an Active Member in good standing of a chartered Lions club in good standing in his/her single or sub-district. (b) Have served or will have served at the time he/she takes office as first or second vice district governor: (i) As officer of a Lions club for a full term or major portion thereof; and (ii) As a member of the district cabinet for a full term or major portion thereof. (iii) With none of the above being accomplished concurrently."

Duties:

"c) Second Vice District Governor.

The second vice district governor is subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor. His/her specific responsibilities shall be to:

- (1) Further the purposes of this association.
- (2) Serve as the key District Governor Team liaison to the Global Leadership Team and actively participate and inspire other district officers to administer and promote effective leadership development.
- (3) Work with the District Governor, First Vice District Governor, and the Global Membership Team to develop and implement a district-wide plan for membership growth.
- (4) Perform such duties as assigned by the district governor.
- (5) Perform such other functions and act as required by the policy of the association.
- (6) Actively participate in all cabinet meetings and conduct all meetings in the absence of the district governor and the first vice district governor.
- (7) Participate in the preparation of the district budget.
- (8) Actively engage in all matters to be continued during the following year.
- (9) At the request of the district governor, supervise appropriate district committees and participate in the review of strengths and weaknesses of the district."

Unnoticed and untreated, even small foot injuries can quickly become infected, potentially leading to serious complications.

Prevention is the best medicine. A good daily foot-care routine and good blood sugar control will help keep your feet healthy.


If you have any of the list below, it's time to seek professional help.



IRON CLAD CONTRACT - This came about from the ironclad ships of the Civil War. It meant something so strong it could not be broken.
